Last month, on a conference call with JHU and the schools implementing Matrix, SunGard Higher Education announced that they will no longer be marketing or selling the Matrix product. They will continue to support bug fixes, regulatory updates (including financial aid, 1098T, test score format changes and IPEDS changes), minor enhancements, and technology certifications through 2014. In addition, SunGard guaranteed us that they will honor their commitment to support JHU through our SSS go-live, delivering promised SSS functionality with their December 2006 release. Over the next month, we will be having additional conversations with the vendor and with the other universities using the product to determine what our next steps will be.

In the meantime, we have set up a "Matrix Town Hall" space in Confluence. This "virtual town hall" has a two-fold mission:

- (1) to provide a single location to post official information regarding the future of the Matrix product from the vendor and from JHU project leadership
- (2) to provide a location for those who are interested to gather (virtually) and engage in a dialogue via blog

We'd like to encourage you to take some time to review the space and post your thoughts and concerns and to stay connected to the on-going activities as we work together to review our options and identify a long-term strategy.



# Records and Registration Updates [SSS]

**Go-live for Nursing as an early adopter is just over three months away!** Development work is underway on numerous efforts and will wrap up for most initiatives by the end of the calendar year. In the past month, some significant events included:

- Received and tested beta releases of new SSS features to be released as SSS 2.6.2.2; continued collaborative design sessions with SunGard and reviewed prototypes for additional enhancements
- Formed integration testing workgroup to review testing items and began writing test cases
- Completed design of Self-Service search for classes, enrollment cart,

enrollment details, enrollment results and class schedule functionalities

- Selected Sympa as the email list server that will replace Puppeteer and provide dynamic lists to faculty of students enrolled in their classes
- Continued testing USIS data migration/interface with the expectation that the student instance will be moved to production in November
- Continued design and development of divisional and shared reports

# Financial Aid Updates [SAS]

Earlier this month, the SAS User group tested a beta version of the 2.6.2.2 regulatory release. After several iterations, we're happy to report that the

final version is now in production. The current release supports the 2007-2008 College Board Profile import, estimated federal EFC calculations and COD data exchange, using the new 2.0e XML Schema. The January SAS regulatory release will contain the official 2007-2008 federal EFC calculations, as well as the ability to import FAFSA records.

The IDOC (Institutional Documentation) service implementation team participated in the first round of user acceptance testing, and the results were favorable. The team will continue testing during the month of December, and is still on target for a January go-live.

**SAS Tip of the Month** 

**Use Stored Queries and the Batch Functions / Communications - Batch** functionality in ISIS to quickly assign and extract letters and e-mails to a tar-

geted group of students. This is an effective technique for simple letters and static emails, allowing end users to avoid the change control process as there is usually no rule configuration involved.

Over the past several months, a number of users have expressed frustration with the list of values for countries in ISIS as noted in JIRA CMN-2373. Nicole Westrick recently met with Craig Smith and Barbara Shaffer to discuss this and other changes to common codes. They will be meeting regularly to address additional common code items beginning in January.

This represents a first step to address the items that are creating challenges for SMS users. The change to country values should address challenges that the current ISIS values create for mailing information to prospects and applicants. The following table describes the changes to country values to facilitate postal mail:

## Civilize Your SQL

Some Database users who write SQL queries may wonder, "What is the big deal regarding a DBA Code Review? After all, if you write a query and it returns the data you want, what else matters?"

Here is a good analogy to explain this question:

A young farmer, for the first time, had to bring his produce to the market in a distant town. Lacking any modern transportation, he packed up his produce on his oxen and set out walking to town over bumpy, muddy paths that linked the various farms. As he got closer to town, the muddy path was transformed into a smooth, paved road. "Wow, what a



difference to be out of the mud!" he said as he moved his oxen into the center lane of the road, "I will get to market much faster this way!" Soon, cars, buses and trucks were backed up behind the farmer, honking their horns. The farmer, oblivious to the angry drivers, thought the noise was the nice townspeople welcoming him with a parade and musical fanfare. "What friendly people! This must be the mayor..." he said noticing one person

with a blue uniform, a hat and a club running towards him. To the farmer's shock and dismay, the man with the blue uniform grabbed him by the arms, and yanked the oxen out of the road, spilling their produce that was on their backs. "What are you doing in the middle of the road!?!" screamed the man with the hat at the shocked farmer. "What did I do wrong? I was simply going to the market..." replied the farmer.

Similarly, our large, central ISIS database is like a large highway being shared with many others. Certain queries or data update scripts that perform inefficiently can block data and performance for other ISIS users. The DBA is much like a traffic cop—keeping the traffic moving at an optimal pace and making sure no one is blocking the road.

## Meet the ISIS Staff... Justin Cooke
