New Policy On Use of Student SSNs

You've read the headlines...

- *Boeing Corporate Laptop Stolen; 382,000 Identities at Risk* (12/13/2006)
- *UCLA: Hacker May Have Accessed 800,000 Students' Personal Data* (12/13/2006)
- *Social Security Numbers for Millions of Veterans Stolen From V.A. Official's Home* (5/22/2006)
- *Laptop Stolen in Baltimore May Have Personal Data of 193 Driver's Licenses* (8/26/2006)
- *Laptop theft puts data of 98,000 at risk* (3/29/2005)
- *Hackers steal ID info from Virginia university* (1/10/2005)

Stories of identity theft aren't new; the list of recent headlines above is only a sampling. The risks and importance of securing personal data are real and are being brought more into the forefront, especially here at JHU.

In late December 2006, the Provost and Council of Deans approved a more formal policy on the protection and use of student Social Security numbers (SSN). This new policy, effective immediately, is the latest in establishing best practices and standards for protecting the privacy of the student SSN. The policy places limitations on the use of the student SSN in the financial aid, admissions, billing, and registration process. The University considers the student SSN, or any part thereof, to be "personally identifiable information" under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA).

Part of the driving force behind this new policy was student concerns of "inappropriate uses" of their Social Security numbers by members of the administrative staff and faculty. The university also was concerned about the potential for identify theft. Many of you have read in the news of the numerous cases and lawsuits involving accidental release of this confidential information. This new policy reinforces the seriousness of the handling of SSNs.

Specific policy guidelines include:

- University employees may not post the student's SSN or publish it on a Web page.
- SSN data may not be transmitted electronically to any party outside JHU without appropriate authorization and security controls.
- JHU student administration databases and datasets may not store or otherwise maintain a student SSN, except as required for government reporting or other specific business purposes.

The SSN will still be collected as part of the application process, as it is needed for certain government reporting and as part of applying for financial aid, billing and employment. Divisional leadership will be held responsible for ensuring that the number of physical repositories of SSNs and usage of it are kept to a minimum.

What Does This Mean to Me?

Individuals that interact with SSNs in any way will be required to complete the *Social Security Number Protection and Appropriate Use* training course in the next few months. More information on this course and other changes related to this new policy will be communicated as soon as they are available. Billing Updates [SBS]

The SBS Team will be re-organizing our thoughts and working towards confirming our Tuition and Fee Rates programming for SSS testing before Go-Live in March. We will be working with Steve Hellen and his team, plus our returning friend Jason Shaffner, to try and “untangle” all the various divisional needs and processes for tuition assessments. We will start with our Feb.6-7 functional and technical team workshops at Mt. Washington.



We are creating our “Wish List” for improvements to SBS, with the hopes that whatever Sungard can’t provide will be assessed by our own SIS Team for enhancements. Having used SBS for over two years, we’ve created various work-arounds and alternative processes that we hope can be revised. We’re also investigating areas of existing SBS functionality that we did not need to use at our Go-Live which are now more relevant to our needs....so the exploration continues!

Our next SBS Team Meeting will be Tuesday, Feb 6th from 10am to noon, at the MTW Campus - Davis Bldg. Room 133.

New Web-Based Mailing List Manager coming in Fall 2007

Beginning in Fall 2007, Johns Hopkins University will be launching a new way for faculty, advisers, and students to communicate outside of the classroom. This will be done by using an open source tool called Sympa. Sympa is an up and coming mail list manager that is used by many universities such as Duke, UMBC, UNC, Harvard Law School and more.



The Sympa mailing list manager has a web interface called WWSympa, providing you access to the mailing lists and your subscriptions. Using WWSympa, you can search for and view various mailing lists, manage the lists you’re subscribed to, manage lists you own or are a moderator of, and a small host of other functions.

The initial use of Sympa will integrate with ISIS to allow instructors to email all students enrolled in their courses.

Records and Registration Updates [SSS]

Nursing's go-live as an early adopter is quickly approaching and efforts are focused on making sure they are successful! Nursing’s integration test begins this month and will simulate the activities through the course of an academic year. While previous testing has validated that individual features work as expected, this final testing step aims to validate that all pieces of SSS function seamlessly when brought together. After integration testing is complete for Nursing, other divisions will go through the same process. In the past month, some significant events included:

- Upgraded production to SSS 2.6.2.2, which is the version of Matrix that will be used for go-live
- Completed initial testing of each student Self-Service screen
- Continued testing student enrollment data migrated from USIS
- Continued design and development of divisional reports
- Finalized training curriculum and schedule

Financial Aid Updates [SAS] Admissions Updates [SMS]

This month, the SAS user group will begin revising our ISIS rules and reports to point to SSS data. A series of weekly design and development meetings will start on February 6th, and continue through the SSS go-live. The meetings will be held in the ISIS lab at Mt. Washington, and all divisions are encouraged to participate.

In late January, several members of the JHU SAS user group participated in a conference call with the SAS product manager at SunGard to discuss possible changes to the SAS award and disbursement user interface. JHU end users have often complained (and rightly so!) that the award revision process in ISIS is cumbersome and error prone. SunGard has acknowledged the problems and is interested in improving the process for users.

Later this month, the SAS 2.6.2.3 release will be moved into production, enabling schools to import 2007-2008 FAFSA data. The first IDOC (Institutional Documentation Service) production files will be processed into ISIS, capping months of collaborative design and development work by HITS and the ASEN financial aid office.

The next SAS user group conference call will be held on February 13, 2007 at 9am. Dial 1-866-800-0606 and enter a participant code of 55375144 to access the call.

SAS Tips for the Month

Have you rolled your 2006-2007 funds over to 2007-2008? Remember to update the Payment Type (transaction code) values for all of your year specific funds. 008 versions of all 007 transaction codes were created in December, and are available in production. SAP numbers associated with transaction codes can be viewed by using the SBS VIEW TC and TCG ISIS role.

Review the disbursement schedules associated with your Federal Work Study funds to ensure that the award begin date is set to the earliest date on which a student can start working. If actual earnings are processed prior to this date, they will error out on the payroll-ISIS interface.

The Transaction Code Request workbook has been updated to reflect the SAP budget number changes. Please be sure to download the latest workbook from Confluence at <https://know.isis.jhu.edu/x/kEU> before submitting new requests.

SMS Wish List

The SMS Wish List page has been created in Confluence at <https://know.isis.jhu.edu/x/kXE>. Use this page to document anything in SMS that is particularly cumbersome or time-intensive. This page is the start of a conversation and will provide the building blocks for developing a long-term plan for attacking these issues. As you think about these items, be sure to think more generically and don't be limited by the current application's functionality. You can also make suggestions on screens that could be reorganized to work better for your business processes.



There will be sessions scheduled to facilitate discussions. David Paolino will be facilitating these sessions in the Spring.

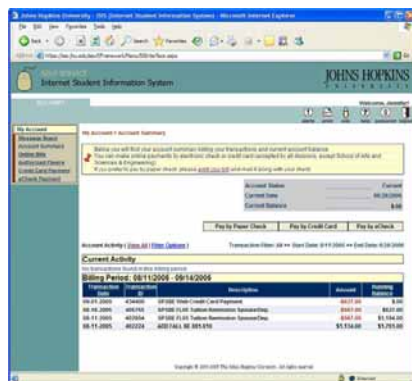
Important Reminders When Working with SSNs...

- Please refrain from including SSNs in emails, letters, and JIRA issues. When a student needs to be uniquely identified, please *use the ISISID (e.g. TC1234BX) or HopkinsID (e.g. FGB3E1) as an alternative identifier.*
- When working with screenshots in JIRA, emails, etc., remember to *remove any SSNs that may be on your screenshots.* (See detailed instructions in Confluence — <http://know.isis.jhu.edu/x/9yo>)

Self-Service Updates

Go-live for Nursing as an early adopter is just one month away! SSS Self-Service design and development activities continue in full force for the March 2007 Nursing go-live. Divisional testing on new SSS functionality has continued throughout the month of January—yielding quality feedback for the Self-Service developers. Integration testing will be starting the week of February 5th, making sure everything is in tip top shape for Nursing in March.

The Self-Service team has continued to make improvements to the new framework. You may recall from a previous issue of *ISIS Focus* that the team is revamping the look and feel of the site. Currently, after the student logs in, they are presented with a choice of several roles. Typically there is one role for Financial Aid and one for Billing. The student chooses one and then proceed to the site to view just that information. The concept of switching roles by clicking the role icon in the upper right is a bit unintuitive.



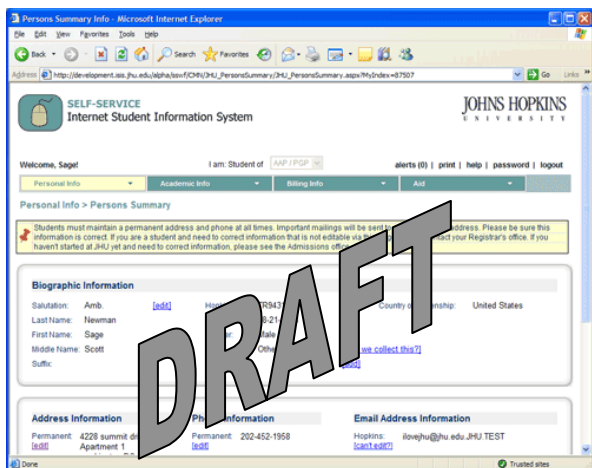
Current Self-Service site

The Self-Service team is changing this in the next iteration of Self-Service due out in March. We've moved away from the concept of roles. Now the student will be able to see all relevant information at one time with the new navigational menu. The new menu has made for a more clean looking site as well as freed up more space for the main content. Another improvement is the Alerts functionality. Currently there is no visual indication to the student that they have an alert. The alerts icon always looks the same regardless if there are zero alerts or three alerts. The alerts link is now a text link that shows the number of alerts, just like an email mailbox:

Alerts (0) — student has zero alerts

Alerts (3) — student has three alerts

Improvements like these are designed to help make the student's experience with Self-Service a better one. Moving away from the concept of roles is crucial to presenting a user-friendly site. Look for these changes and more in March!

Red Light... Green Light...I'm it!



A while back, after a busy week of code reviews, index tuning, data cleaning and other exciting DBA tasks, I was looking forward to a relaxed weekend, especially taking an afternoon nap on the couch, drifting off into a dream-like state, far away from my DBA workweek. My kids had another plan.

As I made it to the couch, I heard them start one of their favorite games, “Red Light / Green Light”. In case you missed it during your childhood, I will give a brief overview of Red Light/ Green Light.

“Red light” means freeze in your tracks...if you move you are out. “Green light” means run towards the goal. There is one person called “It” who has the honor of calling out “Red Light” or “Green Light” to the other players and then judging (objectively ...of course) whether or not they behaved according to the rules.



The first person who gets to the goal without getting dropped out of the game is the next “It”.

I quickly realized that this was a great analogy for the way the DBA reviews the numerous SQL programs submitted for use in the ISIS database. This month there were over 275 SQL programs submitted for review!

Sometimes, the submitted code is dangerous – it will corrupt data or block other things from running properly. These get a RED LIGHT. The code MUST be fixed before it can move on to the Production ISIS.

Other times, the code is working, but has other issues like slow performance or outdated methods. These get a Yellow light, meaning, proceed with caution. In this case, the code may proceed to Production when an agreement and future schedule is setup to address open issues.

The winner is code that makes it to the goal the first time around. These get a Green Light and can go right away to the Prod environment because they follow the guidelines we have set out for ISIS database access.

The only difference when the DBA plays Red Light / Green Light is that I always get to be It (until we get called in for dinner).
